



LAS VEGAS PAIUTE TRIBE CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER CONSUMER STATEMENT

The Las Vegas Paiute Tribe Child Development Center (CDC) is fully funded by a Tribal CCDF Block Grant with an emphasis on providing quality childcare for qualified Native American children*.

The CDC accepts children from ages 3 (toilet trained) through 12. The hours of operation are Monday thru Friday from 7:30am – 6:00pm.

The CDC meets the Health and Safety Standards as outlined in “Minimum Health and Safety Standards: A Guide for American Indian and Alaska Native Child Care and Development Fund Grantees. An IHS Environmental Health Officer from the Department of Health & Human Services, Indian Health Service Office of Environmental Health and Engineering conducts an annual Environmental Health Survey and an annual Food Service Survey. The results of these inspections are posted in the main lobby of the center. The Tribal Lead Agency also makes unannounced visits throughout the year.

The CDC promotes equal access by offering childcare to all qualified Native American children*. Free childcare is available from 9:00am-4:00pm Monday thru Thursday. For those families who are working, attending a job training program or attending an educational program and need extended hours, childcare fees are based on a sliding fee scale. Parental complaints can be submitted verbally or in writing to the CDC Director and if the parent is not satisfied with that result, or if the complaint involves the CDC Director, they may file a written complaint to the Las Vegas Paiute Tribe Administration Office.
